## **Acting Chairperson's Report**

While this year will remain one of sadness it is also important to reflect on the challenges and success of the past year. 2022 was another year filled with achievements and progress across the organisation. The unexpected death of our Chairman, Jeremy Upton in January of this year was a shock to us all, and in writing the Chairman's Report for 2022, I would like to acknowledge the enormous contribution Jeremy made to RIST as a Board Member and Chairman. His passion and commitment to agriculture was an inspiration to us all and will be permanently remembered through the Jeremy Upton scholarship program.

One of the highlights of 2022 was the strong performance of the agriculture industry. Commodity prices continued to exceed expectations in all markets, and favorable climatic conditions provided a boost to landholders in areas that had previously faced challenges.

I'm proud to share that RIST continued to maintain its position as one of the largest non-public agricultural training providers in Australia. In 2022, we delivered over 200,000 hours of training to 545 students across the country. Since 2006, we have graduated more than 2650 young people in vocational education programs, and these graduates have made a major contribution as they continued to pursue a range of careers in the agricultural sector. The demand for our graduates from employers has been unprecedented and continues to grow.

The Lifetime Ewe Management program has continued to be the most successful sheep extension program ever delivered in Australia, directly impacting on 36% of the ewe flock in Australia. The program has been delivered to over 5,000 sheep producers in Victoria, New South Wales, Tasmania, Queensland, South Australia, and Western Australia. This program has been instrumental in improving the

productivity and sustainability of the sheep industry in Australia and a contributor to the national sheep flock increase in 2022. The Heifers for Profit and Weaners for Profit programs were launched in 2022, and we are seeing growers enrolling in these courses in New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia.

Furthermore, our strong relationships with the school network across Victoria's southwest region, as well as Agriculture Victoria, AWI, MLA, ACFE, and Dairy Australia, have been significant contributors to RIST's ongoing success. These partnerships have allowed us to provide comprehensive and integrated education pathways for our students, from preaccredited education and traineeships in agriculture to higher education. This unique offering, combined with our national nonaccredited fee-for-service short course programs, sets RIST apart as a leading agricultural college in Australia.

I would like to express my appreciation to my fellow Board members for their support and sound guidance throughout 2022. I would also like to thank our dedicated staff and CEO Bill Hamill for their competence and resilience in navigating the challenges of the past year.

Lastly, I would like to extend the Board's gratitude to the entire RIST community, including our students, parents, employers, schools, and trainers, for their enthusiasm and support during the volatility of the past year. Together, we have overcome challenges through the COVID period and achieved significant milestones, and we are excited for the opportunities that lie ahead in the coming years.

### Samantha Yvonne Dridan





### **Vocational Education & Training**

A core component of RIST's success in agricultural education is its innovative and expansive Vocational Education Training (VET) Program.

In 2022, RIST had over 280 enrolments across accredited qualifications, pre-accredited courses and fee for service short course programs.

VET offers students a clear pathway for studies in agriculture, with Certificates II and III in Shearing; Certificate II in Wool Handling; Certificate IV in Wool Classing; Certificates II, III, IV in Agriculture, the Diploma of Agriculture and the Bachelor of Agriculture.

In 2022, VET students were drawn from Eastern Gippsland, the Wimmera, Northern Victoria and Western Victoria.

The comprehensive VET programs delivered by RIST including accredited and non-accredited courses offers broad, hands-on, practical training to meet industry demand and deliver workplace ready graduates.

The flexible and innovative delivery of studies also enhances the uptake of skills, with all learning resources for VET courses available online. The state-of-the-art platform allows a range of learning styles to be catered for, including learning via instructional videos, interactive activities such as drop and drags, guizzes and formative activities.

RIST's VET is strengthened by its engagement and working relationships with grassroots industry, the public and private sector and three tier government input. Wool industry body, AWI continues to be an important partner in delivering courses such as Lifetime Ewe Management and shearing/wool handling courses. Our dairy and beef industry employers provide invaluable feedback, support and solid relationships with dozens of schools across Victoria's southwest which assist RIST's VET program.

In total, approximately 122,000 scheduled training hours were delivered across all vocational programs throughout the calendar year.



### **Victorian Livestock Loading Scheme**




RIST is a provider of short courses, including the Victorian Livestock Loading Scheme – an important and popular course which aims to train participants about safe transportation of livestock, including reducing the chances of animals being injured, increasing the productivity of livestock transport, protecting road and bridge infrastructure and reducing the chances of vehicles rolling over.

In 2022, RIST enrolled 35 participants via partner Livestock & Rural Transporters Association of Victoria (LTRAV), all of whom successfully completed the course.

Participants came from across Victoria, South Australia and New South Wales for training online via Zoom, run from 8am – 3pm every two months on the last Friday of that month.

2022 courses ran from February to December.

### **Shearing and Wool Programs**

The Shearing and Wool programs were a resounding success in 2022, with a range of workshops, schools, and competitions taking place throughout the year. These events provided comprehensive training and practical experience to students, ensuring they acquired the necessary skills and knowledge to become skilled professionals in the shearing and wool industry.

The Certificate II in Agriculture Crutching and Grinding elective provided hands-on training in essential skills for the shearing industry. Two workshops were conducted, each spanning three days, and students had the opportunity to learn crutching and grinding techniques, which are crucial to their success in the industry.

The Shearing Schools were held at multiple locations throughout 2022, with 22 students participating in the program. They gained practical experience and honed their shearing skills, ensuring they were well-prepared for a successful career in the industry. Additionally, the 'come and try' shearing and wool demonstrations at Sheepvention provided interested individuals with an opportunity to experience shearing and wool handling firsthand.

The Wool Overview Program targeted high school Year 9 and 10 students with the aim to educate them about the wool industry. The program was a great success, with 45 students from various

schools participating in the program. They visited different locations and gained insights into various aspects of the wool industry, ensuring they acquired a comprehensive understanding of the industry.

The Wool Classing program had students across the Hamilton and Sale areas. The blended delivery, which included both online and face-toface sessions, ensured that all students received comprehensive training in the necessary skills and knowledge.

RIST students and trainers participated in competitions and achieved notable success in 2022. Rosina Te Maipi represented RIST at the Graduate Wool Classer Competition at the Royal Sydney Easter Show, showcasing the high level of training provided by RIST. Additionally, Mark Purcell, a wool trainer with RIST, became the Australian Champion at the National Shearing and Wool Handling Championships held in Bendigo, demonstrating the calibre of trainers and students associated with RIST.

Overall, the Shearing and Wool Program at RIST in 2022 were a great success. The programs continued to contribute to the development of skilled and knowledgeable professionals in the shearing and wool industry. We are proud of our students and trainers.



### **National Programs**



2022 saw the continued growth and expansion of the national programs, with over 350 wool growers enrolling in the Lifetime Ewe Management (LTEM) course and the successful launch of the Heifers for Profit (HFP) course with 29 producers enrolling across Australia.

Despite facing challenges such as La Nina weather patterns, which caused excessive rain and flooding in some regions, RIST's programs have continued to thrive. While some LTEM groups in New South Wales and Victoria have been delayed due to flooding, RIST remains committed to supporting producers as they deal with potential challenges such as flystrike and wet ground for yarding sheep or cattle during training days.

RIST is also pleased to acknowledge the ongoing support from Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) with the signing of another three-year contract that subsidizes wool growers to undertake LTEM. AWI and RIST's collaboration has been a crucial part of the success of LTEM over the last 15 years, and RIST looks forward to many more years of partnership. Furthermore, RIST has secured funding from Limestone Coast Landscape Board in South Australia to support wool growers to continue training in weaner management and sustainability, with the pilot course Weaners for Profit set to be delivered in the Lower South East of South Australia in 2023, exclusively for groups who have completed LTEM.

RIST and AWI held LTEM Regional Trainer Forums in three states, including New South Wales, South Australia, and Victoria, with the majority of trainers attending. Trainers welcomed updates in industry research and participated in condition scoring collaboration and pasture assessment activities, which are relevant to the ongoing success and knowledge of the LTEM course.

Another highlight in 2022 was the support from Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) with the acceptance of RIST's HFP course under the Profitable Grazing Systems program. This allows red meat producers to access subsidies to undertake the course, which focuses on key concepts in heifer reproduction in the southern beef industry. With new trainers joining the team and the establishment of groups in South Australia, New South Wales, and Victoria, RIST is excited about the future of the HFP course, with continued interest still being received for training in 2023.

Once again, RIST's national programs have been strongly sought after throughout 2022, with the continued support from AWI and now MLA with Heifers for Profit. RIST remains committed to providing quality training and support to wool growers and red meat producers across Australia, and looks forward to another successful year in 2023.




### Graduation

### **Certificate II in Agriculture**

In 2022, we welcomed a record number of students into our re-designed Certificate II in Agriculture Program to our Hamilton and Terang campuses, where they embarked on a journey of discovery and hands-on learning.

Our students started the year by diving into the fundamentals of livestock feeding and familiarising themselves with industry terminology. They also gained a deep understanding of workplace health and safety (WHS) and how it applies to all aspects of agricultural work.

One of the highlights of the program was a tour of local dairy farms, where students had the opportunity to observe heavily pregnant and calving cows as part of their birthing duties unit. We are grateful to our generous producers who opened their farms to our students, providing them with invaluable real-world insights into farming life.

Our students also had numerous practical days, including machinery operation and fencing where they learned various techniques, along with lamb and calf marking days. These practical sessions were kept to small group sizes to ensure maximum learning and practice opportunities.

In addition to the core units, students were able to choose from a range of electives that matched their interests, such as milk livestock, crutching and grinding, wool handling, and agronomy. This allowed them to delve deeper into areas

they were passionate about and expand their knowledge.

Stock handling techniques were also covered in the program, with students enjoying fun and challenging days working with cattle and sheep alongside industry experts. As part of their WHS unit, students also undertook the important task of cleaning and maintaining an old set of yards for the Agriculture Victoria Research Farm, restoring them to comply with WHS standards.









# **Certificate III in Agriculture**



Our Certificate III in Agriculture program had an exciting year in Hamilton and Terang, with a record number of enthusiastic students enrolling. This program runs over 18 months, with the current cohort set to complete their training in late June 2023.

The program covered a wide range of units, including core units on workplace health and safety and machinery, as well as agronomy, feeding plans, chemicals, and livestock units. Students had the opportunity to participate in mini field trips to farms and industry-related sites, as well as try their hand at simulators for a unique learning experience.

One of the program's highlights was a field day at Weeran Angus, where students had a chance to explore trial setups by Upper Valley and gain insights into agronomy practices. Inspired by this experience, RIST will be creating its own trial plot on campus in 2023.

We also reintroduced our popular Dog School unit in 2022, where students learned valuable skills in managing their own dogs and livestock from industry expert Ian O'Connell. An Introduction to Welding unit was introduced into the program, which was a big hit amongst our students. This practical-based unit allowed them to get hands-on and create functional bag trolleys by the end of the unit.

Throughout the program, students engaged with industry specialists, expanding their knowledge and gaining insights into different units. We are proud of our students' achievements and look forward to seeing them thrive in the agricultural industry!



# **Certificate IV in Agriculture**

The Certificate IV in Agriculture is designed to equip students with the skills and expertise necessary to take on a leadership position in the agricultural industry. With multiple areas of study, students became well-prepared to manage a farm and work towards their agricultural career goals.

Over the course of 12 months, students had the opportunity to develop their knowledge and practical skills in Livestock Production, Agronomy, Agribusiness, Work Health and Safety, and Entrepreneurship. The program has been designed to challenge students and provide them with a comprehensive understanding of the industry.

One of the unique benefits of this qualification is the flexibility it offers. The Certificate IV in Agriculture was delivered in both our Terang &

Hamilton campuses, allowing students to choose the location that best suits their needs. This allowed for greater accessibility and convenience for those who are already working in the industry or have other commitments.

Kate Carmody, one of the Certificate IV & Diploma Program Coordinators, is thrilled with the quality of work submitted by the co-hort, stating that it was "exceptional and outstanding". This is a testament to the high standard of education and training that is provided at RIST.

Upon completion of this program, students have gained the skills and expertise to step up to a supervisor or team leader position in an agricultural enterprise.



## **Diploma of Agriculture**

The Diploma of Agriculture course is a qualification designed to develop managerial-level skills within the agricultural industry. The course content is structured to provide students with a solid foundation in all key components of the agricultural industry including business management, whole farm planning, budgeting, livestock production, agronomy, work health safety, and staffing.

Students can complete the course in one or two years, with the program delivered across both Terang and Hamilton campuses to offer flexibility to students. The program allowed students to delve deeper into their studies, gaining an indepth understanding of all key components of the agricultural industry.

The 2022 academic year allowed students to consolidate their learning and develop their skills, resulting in the production of excellent farm managers, farm owners, and agribusiness professionals.





### **Pre Accredited Training**

RIST, a leading educational institution in the agricultural industry, offered a diverse range of pre-accredited training courses in 2022. These courses were designed to provide students with essential skills and knowledge to excel in their chosen field, whether it be for further accredited training or as an upskilling tool for the workplace. The courses covered various areas of agriculture and technology, catering to different age groups and skill levels.

#### **Animal Nutrition**

The Animal Nutrition course aimed to equip learners with basic skills and knowledge in animal nutrition, focusing on maximising animal health and performance in agriculture. Participants learned how to analyse livestock condition and health, assess pastures for a balanced and nutritious diet, introduce feed supplements, and ensure the composition and quality of feed for optimal livestock health and performance. The course also emphasised safe work practices when feeding animals, ensuring the well-being of both the animals and the learners.



#### **Chainsaw Operations**


The Chainsaw Operations course provided learners with fundamental skills and practical experience in operating and maintaining a chainsaw safely. Participants were instructed on how to perform tasks in a safe manner, including complying with Australian Standards for personal protective equipment and understanding workplace health and safety principles. The course focused on experiential learning, allowing learners to gain hands-on experience in basic branch and limb trimming and timber handling on the ground.

#### **Digital Literacy**

The Digital Literacy course targeted potential RIST students aged 15-55 with limited understanding of new-age technology, particularly in accessing web-based learning management systems and communication and collaborative platforms used in the education sector. The course aimed to improve the digital literacy skills of learners, preparing them for vocational education and training at RIST.

#### **Mobile Digital Technology**

The Mobile Digital Technology course targeted potential RIST students aged 15-55 who had limited understanding of the use of mobile digital technology. The course aimed to address the lack of initiative in utilising technology for maximum benefit. Learners gained knowledge and skills in using mobile devices to enhance their learning experience in the classroom and workplace.



#### Introduction to Excel

The Introduction to Excel course was designed for young people aged 15-23 who had enrolled in Certificate II, Certificate III, or Certificate IV in Agriculture at RIST but lacked basic skills in Microsoft Excel. The course aimed to provide learners with the necessary skills in Excel, ensuring their readiness to undertake accredited training with confidence.



#### ATV/SBS

The ATV/SBS course aimed to provide learners with basic skills and practical experience in operating and maintaining a quad bike/side by side safely. Learners gained an understanding of the importance of safety and the risks associated with quad bike operation, while also acquiring the skills, knowledge, and experience sought by employers in the agricultural sector.

#### **Soil Chemistry**

The Soil Chemistry course was designed for individuals wishing to enter accredited agricultural training but lacked the basic knowledge in chemistry. This course catered to early school leavers or those who did not choose STEM skills in their education. Learners gained foundational knowledge in basic chemistry, preparing them to successfully engage in accredited agricultural training.



#### Tractor/FEL

The Tractor/FEL course provided learners with basic skills and practical experience in operating a tractor and front-end loader safely. Participants gained an understanding of safety and risks associated with tractor operation, while also acquiring the skills, knowledge, and experience sought by employers in the agricultural sector.

#### **Working Dog School**

The Working Dog School course was designed for participants to develop skills and knowledge in selecting, training, and caring for working dogs in the agricultural industry. Understanding the natural instincts of working dogs and training them to care for livestock are essential skills sought by employers in the agricultural industry.



#### **Introduction to Welding**

Introduction to Welding is a pre-accredited training course offered by RIST, designed to provide learners with a hands-on experience in welding and equip them with the necessary skills and knowledge for employment in the engineering and agricultural sectors. This course focuses on practical-based experiential learning, giving learners a taste of welding and preparing them for further career opportunities.
