




ANNUAL REPORT

I commence my report by extending my gratitude to Barbara Young for her pivotal role as Acting Chair following the unfortunate passing of Chairman Jeremy Upton. The year 2023 presented several hurdles, notably the persistently bleak forecast for commodity prices in the lamb and beef sectors for a substantial part of the year. This inevitably impacted the implementation of certain national programs within the sheep and beef industry.

Despite the fluctuations in commodity prices and seasonal variations, I take pride in announcing that RIST maintained its stature as one of the foremost non-public providers of agricultural training in Australia. Throughout 2023, we delivered in excess of 275,000 hours of training to 482 students nationwide. Since 2006, we have seen more than 2950 graduates from our vocational education programs, who have significantly contributed to various careers within the agricultural sector. The demand for our graduates from employers has been unprecedented and continues to rise.

The ongoing success of the Lifetime Ewe Management program underscores its status as the most successful sheep extension program ever delivered in Australia. Coupled with our vocational and pre-accredited programs, alongside other national and State-based short courses, RIST stands out, with our students highly sought after by industry.

Our robust partnerships with the school network across Victoria's southwest region, as well as the Victorian and Commonwealth Government, Agriculture Victoria, AWI, MLA and ACFE have been pivotal in ensuring RIST's continued success. These partnerships have facilitated comprehensive education pathways for our students, spanning from pre-accredited education and agriculture traineeships to higher education. This distinct offering, complemented by our national nonaccredited fee-for-service short course programs, positions RIST as a premier agricultural college in Australia.

I extend my appreciation to my fellow Board members for their steadfast support and wise counsel throughout 2023. Bruce Keeley's departure from the Board in April saw Fiona Best and Joff Maclead joining our ranks. I express gratitude to Bruce for his longstanding contribution to RIST and welcome Fiona and Joff. Furthermore, I thank our committed staff and CEO Bill Hamill for their competence and resilience in navigating the challenges of the past year.

Lastly, I wish to convey my gratitude to the entire RIST community, including our students, parents, employers, schools, and trainers, for their unwavering enthusiasm and support during the turbulent times of the past year. Together, we have surmounted challenges and achieved significant milestones, and I look forward with anticipation to the opportunities that await us in the years ahead.

Shearing and Wool Programs

Raelene Laidlaw RIST's Wool Classing trainer had a once in a lifetime opportunity in September to share knowledge and skills beyond Australia's borders, being invited to conduct a number of wool preparation workshops on the Falkland Islands.

Back home, RIST continued its commitment to empowering individuals within the shearing and wool handling industry to enhance their skills and knowledge.

Shearing Schools and Wool Overviews: Four shearing schools were held in Hamilton, Penshurst, and Mortlake areas providing hands-on training and education, equipping participants with essential shearing skills. Additionally, four wool overviews conducted in collaboration with district schools—Monivae College, Mercy College, Good Shepherd College, and Hawkesdale College—offered valuable insights into the wool industry, inspiring the next generation of wool enthusiasts.

Sheepvention: Demonstrations and "come and try" sessions at Sheepvention proved to be popular among attendees of all ages, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation for sheep farming and wool production.

Certificate II in Agriculture Electives: Crutching and Wool Handling electives are available to students undertaking a Certificate II in Agriculture, offering learners specialised training in crutching, grinding, board duties, and wool pressing. These electives provide opportunities for students to explore the shearing and wool industry on a deeper level.

Wool Classing: Certificate IV in Wool Classing: Training is now being delivered through the Gippsland region with six students already successfully completing their qualifications. Learners in this program gained practical hands-on experience through in-shed coach, and wool store and sale tours in Melbourne further enriching their understanding of the wool supply chain.

Cert II and Cert III Shearing: Certificate II and III in Shearing: With the assistance of the RSTF project grant, 8 students successfully completed a Certificate II in Shearing in 2023, providing them with the necessary skills to excel in this crucial aspect of wool production. Additionally, one student successfully completed their Certificate III in Shearing, marking a significant milestone in their professional development.





National Programs

RIST's National Training Programs Showcased Strong Growth in 2023

Throughout 2023, RIST's national training programs continued to make significant strides, providing valuable support and knowledge to wool growers and red meat producers across Australia.

Lifetime Ewe Management (LTEM): In September 2023, RIST hosted Regional Trainer Forums in Naracoorte and Dubbo, fostering collaboration among trainers from various regions. In Naracoorte, trainers from South-West Victoria and South Australia joined forces, while Dubbo saw trainers from New South Wales, Tasmania, and Northern Victoria come together.

A key milestone was the commencement of a new contract with Australian Wool Innovation (AWI), marked by the launch of LTEM 9. This initiative welcomed 225 participants throughout the year, with AWI generously subsidizing \$900 per wool grower. Additionally, FeedTest continued to support LTEM participants by offering a 10% discount on NIR fodder testing, further enhancing the program's value and accessibility.

Heifers for Profit (HFP): In 2023, HFP saw improved growth, with three groups commencing under Rob Inglis in Goulburn, Bungendore, and Coolac areas of NSW. Another group, led by Molly Kalman and Steph Warrick, started in the Naracoorte area, supported by a contract with Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) under the Profitable Grazing Systems program.

Weaners for Profit (WFP): RIST's WFP course also saw expansion, thanks to partnerships with local organisations. The Local Land Service (LLS) subsidised the WFP course in NSW, with Rob Inglis delivering sessions for groups in Carrathool and Paraway. Additionally, the Limestone Coast Landcare Board provided subsidies exclusively for residents in the region. Jonathan England and Tim Leeming commenced training sessions in the Limestone Coast and Wrattenbullie areas, respectively, in 2023.

Australian Wool Education Trust

The Australian Wool Education Trust and in 2023 generously provided scholarships to the value of \$9,000.00 to students undertaking studies in merino wool production at RIST.

Victorian Livestock Loading Scheme

In 2023, RIST partnered with LRTAV to enrol 31 participants in the Victorian Livestock Loading Scheme. All successfully completed the course, learning vital skills for safe livestock transportation, reducing injuries, and enhancing efficiency. Attendees hailed from Victoria, South Australia, and New South Wales, reflecting the program's broad reach. Leveraging digital platforms like Zoom, RIST

conducted bi-monthly sessions, making training accessible to all despite geographical barriers. This adaptive approach ensured the seamless dissemination of crucial knowledge, contributing to safer roads and more efficient livestock transport. RIST's commitment to excellence in education and industry advancement remains unwavering.





Certificate II and III in Agriculture

Certificate II in Agriculture: This program immersed students in a hands-on learning journey, providing them with practical skills vital for the agricultural sector. They participated in calf marking sessions, deftly marking numerous calves for local producers, and experienced the intricacies of lamb marking, a fundamental aspect of livestock management. Engaging in yard maintenance tasks for the Department of Agriculture, students not only contributed to farm infrastructure but also honed their understanding of farm operations.

Basic machinery operations became second nature to students as they learned to handle farm equipment, a skill crucial for day-to-day tasks.

Under the tutelage of industry experts Joe Spicer and Scott Mullins, students learnt low-stress stock handling techniques, refining their approach to livestock management.

Industry exposure played a pivotal role in their learning journey. Visits to local farms provided firsthand insights, with farmers generously sharing their knowledge and expertise. A trip to a local dairy offered a glimpse into the calving process and calf rearing practices, enriching students' understanding of animal husbandry. Shearing shed visits offered practical exposure to wool handling, crutching, and grinding, essential skills in the agricultural landscape.

Certificate III in Agriculture: Building upon their foundational knowledge, students embarked on a journey of discovery in the Certificate III program, exploring progressive local farms and expanding their agricultural horizons. Farm visits opened doors to new pastures, crops, and innovative farming practices. Conversations with producers at Grange Garlic, Byaduk, and other farms sparked creativity, inspiring students with fresh ideas for implementation in the workplace.

Practical skill extension sessions delved into plant nutrition and crop establishment, empowering students with the know-how to optimise crop yields. A welding course added a touch of craftsmanship to their repertoire, as they crafted their own bag trolleys, blending practical skills with creativity.

Specialised training took their learning to new heights. A two-day working dog school, led by renowned breeder and trainer Joe Spicer, offered an immersive experience in livestock management, with students mastering the art of working with trained dogs.



The Diploma of Agriculture program in 2023 continues to serve as a robust platform for cultivating managerial-level skills within the agricultural sector. Designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of various facets of the industry, including business management, farm planning, budgeting, livestock production, agronomy, work health safety, and staffing, this qualification sets the stage for aspiring professionals to excel in their careers.

Offered over one or two years, the program accommodates the diverse needs of students, with classes available at both Hamilton, Terang and through our virtual classroom facility. This flexibility enables individuals to delve deeply into their studies, honing their expertise and preparing them for roles as farm managers, owners, or agribusiness leaders.

In parallel, the Certificate IV in Agriculture program equips students with the necessary skills and knowledge to take on leadership roles within the agricultural domain. With a curriculum spanning livestock production, agronomy, agribusiness, work health and safety, and entrepreneurship, participants undergo a transformative journey over the course of 12 months or 24 months.

What sets this qualification apart is its adaptability. Offered across multiple delivery points, including Hamilton, Terang or through virtual classrooms, students have the freedom to choose the location that aligns best with their needs and commitments. This accessibility ensures that individuals can pursue their educational goals without sacrificing travel time away from work.

Under the guidance of leading industry trainers, the Certificate IV & Diploma, students produce work of exceptional quality. Their achievements serve as a testament to the rigorous education and training offered at RIST.

Upon completion of these programs, graduates emerge equipped with the practical skills and expertise needed to assume supervisory or leadership positions within agricultural enterprises. They stand ready to make meaningful contributions to the industry and drive its continued growth and innovation in the years to come.





Pre-Accredited Training

Pre-Accredited Training Courses Offered in 2023 by RIST

In 2023, RIST, continued its commitment to offering a diverse array of pre-accredited training courses. These courses were meticulously crafted to furnish students with vital skills and knowledge, either as a stepping stone towards further accredited training or as a means to enhance their proficiency in the workplace. Addressing various aspects of agriculture and technology, these courses were tailored to accommodate individuals of different age groups and skill levels.

Animal Nutrition: The Animal Nutrition course remained a cornerstone, aiming to impart learners with fundamental skills and knowledge essential for optimising animal health and performance in agriculture. Participants delved into livestock condition assessment, pasture evaluation for a balanced diet, introduction of feed supplements,

and ensuring feed quality for optimal livestock health. Emphasis was placed on safe feeding practices to safeguard both animals and learners.

Chainsaw Operations: Continuing its emphasis on safety, the Chainsaw Operations course equipped learners with essential skills in operating and maintaining chainsaws safely. Instruction included adherence to best practice for personal protective equipment and comprehension of workplace health and safety principles. Through hands-on learning, participants gained proficiency in basic branch and limb trimming and timber handling on the ground.

Introduction to Excel: Addressing the needs of young learners enrolled in agricultural certificate programs, the Introduction to Excel course equipped them with basic Microsoft Excel skills. By fostering confidence in Excel usage, learners were prepared for their accredited training journey at RIST.

Mobile Digital Technology: Similarly, the Mobile Digital Technology course targeted individuals with limited understanding of mobile digital technology, aiming to maximize its benefits in both educational and workplace settings. Learners gained practical skills in utilising mobile devices to enhance their learning and productivity.

ATV/SBS: Prioritising safety in agricultural operations, the ATV/SBS course provided learners with essential skills in operating quad bikes and side-by-sides safely. Emphasis was placed on risk awareness and practical skills sought by agricultural employers.

Soil Chemistry: The Soil Chemistry course catered to individuals lacking basic chemistry knowledge, providing foundational understanding essential for accredited agricultural training.

Tractor/Front End Loader (FEL): Similarly, the Tractor/FEL course equipped learners with practical skills in operating tractors and front-end loaders safely, meeting industry demands for skilled operators.

Introduction to Welding: The Introduction to Welding course offered hands-on experience in welding, preparing learners for employment opportunities in engineering and agriculture through practical-based learning.

The practical skills he gained throughout the course coupled with his work placement assisted him in meeting the requirements for entering Veterinary Bioscience at the University of Adelaide. Rory is now working as a vet in a mixed practice that has clinics in both Naracoorte and Penola.

In August 2022, RIST was successful in obtaining project funding for Reducing C02 Emissions in the Sheep Industry through the Clean Economy Workforce Capability Building Fund (CEWCBF) funded by the Victorian Government - Department of Jobs Skills Industry and Regions (DJSIR). This fund focused on sectors of the Victorian economy impacted by climate change to enable industry to transition towards a clean economy. The project deliverable was to design and pilot digital assets housed on an App. The new App was to build sheep industry productivity and enable producers to contribute to environmental, social, and economic gains in Victoria. The priority investment focused on raising sheep workforce awareness and building capability to support delivery of the Victorian Government net zero emissions by 2050 commitment.

Through collaboration and key project partnerships with industry consultants, R&D experts, RIST staff, and supportive Victorian producers, the project is on track for successful delivery of all project outcomes by quarter 1 2024, and the launch of RISTs new program Your Season Your Success - will take place shortly thereafter. This project has delivered:

App - accessible on Android, iOS, desktop Windows and Mac, and Virtual Reality headsets-Quest Meta 2 & 3.

- 5 e-learning Modules integrated with Your Season Your Success app
- 5 Companion e-books with quick access navigation links.
- Farm FIT (Flexibility Indicator Tool) selfassessment calculator to help sheep producers to benchmark their on-farm resilience based on their production management flexibility.
- Farming to Your Credit immersive virtual reality experience to raise awareness and understanding of how selected production management practices can influence on-farm productivity and emissions intensity.
- Virtual Farm Tours explorative and immersive virtual reality case study experiences specific to production management strategies employed by two different sheep enterprises located within regional Victoria.
- E-learning Digital Badging to promote, through metadata, a learner's successful completion of the App program shareable through social media platforms.









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
